At 5:06 pm, Chairman Marc Komorsky called the Board of Fire Commissioners Regular Meeting to order for Tuesday, September 24th, 2024, and led the Pledge of Allegiance. He welcomed everyone to the meeting.

At 5:07 PM, upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Ward and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to go into Executive for the purpose of union negotiation. Sassi – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Ward – Aye, Taft – Aye, Komorsky – Aye.

OPEN SESSION:

At 5:57 PM, the Board resumed Open Session.

MINUTES: - 9/10/24 Regular Meeting

OLD BUSINESS/UNRESOLVED ITEMS:

- Station 1 Building Update – Commissioner Ward stated that October 1 or October 2 at 6 PM are two dates that the two other architects have availability to meet with the Board. This is to go over the specs with the architects. The Board decided that the date would be October 1 at 6 PM at Station 2.
- Station 3 Storage Room – Commissioner Ward stated there is no update at this time.
- Station 2 Brick Pointing – Commissioner Ward stated there is no update at this time.

LAGRANGE FIRE DISTRICT

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- Staffing Community Events – Chief Champion stated they are moving forward with looking for staffing for the football games for Friday nights. They are also looking for staffing for Fall Festival. Safety Day will be October 12th, and a lot of background has already been put into place for this. That makes it challenging to change the date this year, but they will make sure moving forward that it is not on any of the religious holidays. Chairman Komorsky asked what date the Fall Festival would be and what equipment would be participating. Chief Champion stated equipment will depend on what is out being prepared at that point, but there will at least be an ambulance. Firefighter Henry will be there as the public relations individual. It is scheduled for Sunday, October 20th from 12 noon until 4 PM. So for staffing purposes they will be there from approximately 11 o'clock until 5 PM. He will put those dates out for the volunteer staff as well to see if they can solicit any individuals willing to give their time on a Sunday afternoon. Commissioner Sassi asked if the Chief reached out to the individual he sent to him and Chief Champion said that he sent an e-mail, but has not yet received a reply. He will try to call back again by the end of the week but he has a feeling the date she was looking at may have passed. Chief Champion did thank the Board for permission to staff the Angels of Rock. They did have two individuals with the ambulance there and it was received very warmly.
- ESO Reporting status update – Chief Champion stated he met with Commissioner Ward and Commissioner Pignataro last week. They had a preliminary conversation on what exactly they're looking for. They were able to set up a meeting with another software vendor to see what they are offering. It is one of the vendors being considered by Dutchess County. There is no final commitment from them at this time. They can go into further detail at this point if the Board desires. He does know with this product there are neighbors that have moved to it already and are testing out the system. Commissioner Pignataro stated he was very impressed with the system and the Chief seemed satisfied that it will solve some of the reporting problems they are missing. It also integrates a lot of the other items that the staff uses. The gentleman from Alpine Software put together a proposal that will need to be discussed during executive session. They will work with the district to convert information to get them the reports they are missing. The Chief should not be required to spend a lot of time creating reports in ESO. They are currently using ESO but the question will be how much of ESO will they continue to use if they move forward with this software package. Commissioner Ward stated the strategy is to get them to a single application and database. He does believe they're looking at Red Alert as their primary database for entering the records. They would still use ESO because it is the compliant portion for sending the PCR's to the State. Hopefully Red Alert can come up and meet that standard to do away with some of that. Any of the training software through Target Solutions right now could be brought over into Red Alert as well. They do have assistance writing reports so that is a point in their favor for Commissioner Ward. They want to be able to use reports they have been using for decades and convert it into reports they can get out of Red Alert. They did seem to be able to meet all of those requirements. Chairman Komorsky asked the Chief if this was his number one choice and Chief Champion stated it is in the top two. They have looked at First Due, which is comparable. He has spoken to the Arlington Chiefs and they use Red MNX, which is Red Alert. County is looking at Red MNX, I Command, and I Am Responding. He believes they have narrowed it down to one or two choices as well. Commissioner Pignataro stated it is possible that some of the cost might be covered by Dutchess County. It depends on if LaGrange implemented before the County. Commissioner Ward stated that First Due is a preplanned software, not a NFIRS. Chief Champion stated they

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have expanded their platform and he has been looking for the demo that they recorded so he can share with the Board. It is still a work in progress.

- Grant update – Chief Champion stated he has not received any additional notification. He does have preliminary closeout documentation for Covid 4480 Grant. In regard to the MIG Grant for the ballistic wear, they are in the process of getting sizings. It looks like it will be a 50-50 split on the sizing. He should be getting a final number and breakout from MES within the next couple of days. Then they will move forward and get everything ordered. Then they will submit it to the County for reimbursement. He continues to work on submissions for the SAFER Grant.
- Diesel Tank Accessories - Chief Champion said this is still a work in progress. They continue to do inspections. He is waiting for an estimate from Scott Price for the bollards to be installed. Chairman Komorsky asked if Mr. Price was aware he was going to be doing this job and Chief Champion said yes. They did meet and walk the scope of the project. Commissioner Pignataro asked how long they have been working on this and Chief Champion stated about eight months to a year.
- HIPAA Compliance – Chief Champion stated he sat down with Commissioner Sassi, and they worked out some of the issues. There is some additional documentation that Commissioner Sassi found that he shared and they have not gotten back together again yet to review it. They are also awaiting updates from Jeff to sit down and review with him as well. Chief Champion will reach out to him again to see what dates he is available. Commissioner Sassi stated they should pick a date for the two of them to sit down and review the additional documentation.
- Overhead Doors Painting – Chief Champion said he has not made any further progress on this at this time. There are some vendors who will not touch it because it is prevailing wage. There was a suggestion made to see if the doors could be wrapped. He is also trying to find a sole proprietor painter. Chairman Komorsky stated that wrapping the doors may not be a bad idea.
- Policy Manual/Software Review – Commissioner Sassi stated he and the Chief met with Lexipol. There is nothing new with them since last meeting. They also met with Policy Manager. They did find out the rep they met with was the wrong rep for this region. He met with the new representative yesterday virtually. He did receive some data yesterday that he is not yet shared with the Chief. They are primarily the software management side. They do not do policy or guideline reviews. They have a partnership with another agency. They will need to set a meeting with that agency and see what they have to offer and what the pricing is. Commissioner Sassi also had a brief conversation with the District's counsel regarding what they have to offer as far as policies and employee handbooks. The next step is to reach out to the partner of Policy Manager and schedule a meeting with them. He and the Chief will have to get together to review all of the information they have gotten from all of the companies and come back to the Board with a recommendation.
- Fire Police – Commissioner Sassi said the County scheduled a class for October and there are several people who are interested in attending. The Chief said he will register them through the 911 system.

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- MTQ – Commissioner Sassi said there's nothing new to add on this and it can be removed from the agenda moving forward.
- Station 1 & 3 Fuel Oil Tanks – Chief Champion stated he put a call into Kosco Heritage and is waiting for a reply. This is a work in progress. Commissioner Pignataro asked if this was the fill issue and Chief Champion said yes. Chairman Komorsky asked the Chief to contact him once he hears back from them or if he needs any assistance.
- Building Repairs/Repair Requests – Chairman Komorsky asked if anybody had anything that they had not already spoken about. Commissioner Pignataro asked about the cement issue at Station 1. Chairman Komorsky stated they will talk about that at the next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: -

- County Grant Opportunity – Chief Champion stated that County Executive Sue Serino has put out a grant opportunity for career and volunteer fire districts for EMS in regard to fly cars. This plan does not cover any personnel expenses, apparatus, or radios. It covers part 800 equipment so things like 4 x 4's, bandages, and counts that are needed to maintain a viable part 800 list with New York State Bureau of Emergency Management. They have also looked into AEDs and Lucas devices. LaGrange has been very proactive in obtaining Lucas devices as they are on the primary ambulances as well as the tertiary one. In regard to the AEDs, they would have to be on a fly car. They do have AEDs now and have budgeted for replacement of those AEDs. They also have the Lifepaks on the fly cars that they run now. If the Board wants him to look further into it he feels it may be a misappropriation of time, but if they want to pursue this for additional equipment they can go into it now. It is not a large reimbursement from the County. Commissioner Pignataro asked if they get this grant, does it mean they agree to the recruitment message. Chief Champion stated it is a QR code on the back of the fly car. He does not know at this time where that goes or who sees that information. Commissioner Sassi asked if they know who pays for that application and Chief Champion stated he did not know. He has not seen an answer on that at this time. Commissioner Pignataro asked if the timeline for the grant lines up with the replacement required for the current AEDs. Chief Champion stated the requirement for the grant is that if they get the AED it has to be on that fly car so they can only get one if they were to be awarded the grant. That AED would then have to be on the fly car. Commissioner Pignataro asked if all of the packs expire at the same time and Chief Champion said no. They are staggered. Commissioner Ward stated they have a replacement cycle over the next four years. Commissioner Sassi stated the primary object for this is recruitment. It will come down to if LaGrange wants to participate in the County's recruitment program. The second part is if there is something they can use the money for. Chairman Komorsky stated this is something they have been talking about for a long time. It does not look like it is a hard grant to apply for. Chief Champion stated he does not know if they are excluded because they are a combination department. The grant outlines career and volunteer so he is trying to get an answer on that. Chairman Komorsky stated he believes that they could apply for it which is why he will sent it to the Chief. Commissioner Sassi stated he believed it was for all districts. He stated he would lean towards doing this no matter what. Chairman Komorsky stated he is in favor of doing it as it is not a long application. Commissioner Pignataro stated he is as well. Commissioner Sassi asked if they knew what vehicle they were designated for. Chief Champion stated that the fly car stays at Station 2 and that the fire apparatus and engines have AED's. That sticker or QR code would go on the back of the vehicle. He does not know of the

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outline specific locations for it. He does not know who is managing the program on the County's end. He stated Sue Serino will be here on the eighth. Commissioner Sassi asked how many Lucas's they have right now and Chief Champion said three. The chief said he will move forward with this.

- Stryker service agreement for Lucas devices & Powerload stretchers – Chairman Komorsky stated they have done this every year that they have had them. The total agreement for the for Lucas devices for 48 months with a 15% discount is \$23,378.40. The power load stretchers were two of them for 40 months with a 15% discount is \$7,728.20. The total cost for the 48 months is \$31,106.60. The annual cost is \$7,776.65.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Pignataro and SECONDED by Commissioner Sassi, the Board RESOLVED to approve service agreement with Stryker for the Lucas devices and power load stretchers. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

- Stryker Lifepak 1000 quote – Commissioner Pignataro asked what this was. Chief Champion stated this is a BLS AED. Chairman Komorsky stated that the total cost for 4 of the Lifepak 1000's with 4 each electrodes carry cases with shoulder strap, non-rechargeable battery replacement, instructions, ship kit literature, and infant child reduce energy to fibrillation electrode replacement for a total cost with shipping of \$12,028.28. Commissioner Pignataro asked if these would replace the ones that are in the four ambulances currently. Chief Champion said yes it is part of the replacement program. Treasurer Pozniak asked if there were any other providers for this or if it was a sole proprietorship or state bid. Chief Champion stated there are no other providers for this.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Pignataro and SECONDED by Commissioner Sassi, the Board RESOLVED to approve the purchase of four Lifepak 1000's with the listed accessories at the cost of \$12,028.28. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

- Superior Telephone PM contract – Chairman Komorsky stated that the current contract is about to expire. There were separate prices. The first was just for the equipment at Station 1 in the amount of \$450 and the second was for the equipment at Station 2, to include the chassis, station blades etc. which came to \$1140 and the equipment at Station 3 for \$450.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Pignataro and SECONDED by Commissioner Ward, the Board RESOLVED to approve service agreement with Superior Telephone Systems for \$450 at Station 1, \$1140 Station 2, and \$450 Station 3. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

- The Workplace FAP agreement – Chairman Komorsky stated this is for the Firefighter Assistance Program agreement for October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025 in the amount of \$1560.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Ward and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to approve The Workplace FAP Agreement in the amount of \$1,560 for 10/1/24 – 9/30/25. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

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- MES Camera Quote - Chairman Komorsky stated there is a quote from MES for the purchase of two AttackPRO cameras with two batteries and a desk top battery charger, a gearkeeper, and a truck charger at a cost of \$3,750 each for a total of \$7,500. Commissioner Ward asked if this was a replacement for the MSA 600 and Chief Champion said yes. That is a budgeted item for approximately \$8000. He stated they are still continuing to get MSAs, but this is replacing two TICs that have one out of service due to the nature of parts.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Ward and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to approve the purchase from MES of two AttackPRO cameras with the listed accessories at a cost of \$7,500.00. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

REPORTS: (by officers present)

- **Treasurer Pozniak** - Treasurer Pozniak stated he has an update on the NYClass account set up. Shortly after they get approval to set up these accounts he got a phone call from both Chairman Komorsky and Tompkins Bank. They have a program similar to NYClass. They will match the NYClass interest each Monday for the week and do it with a fully FDIC insured product. Commissioner Ward stated he feels this is a better risk position. Chairman Komorsky stated they need to stay on top of it with the rate changes and Treasurer Pozniak agreed. He stated that some point there may be a third option out there. He does feel they could put some money into NYClass so if things change in the future they are already set up. Chairman Komorsky asked how much money they wanted to put into that account, and he said \$100,000. If the board is not comfortable with that they could do \$10,000 to \$50,000. Chairman Komorsky stated they keep the bulk of everything in Tompkins and put \$10,000 in NYClass. Treasurer Pozniak stated last month they reviewed different options for the 2025 budget, and they do have to choose one tonight that they want to propose. The Board was in agreement with the 6.42 %.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Ward and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to adopt a preliminary 2025 budget at a 6.42% tax levy increase of \$10,447,512. Sassi – Aye, Ward -Aye, Taft – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Treasurer Pozniak stated that is what will be published as the preliminary budget and presented at the Budget Hearing on October 15. They do have the option to make certain changes after that.

- **Chief Anthony Champion**
 - Fire Brigade Standard – Chief Champion stated he is continuing to monitor the changes in the fire brigade standard. There will be a public hearing on 12 November. It does affect the training standards and the volunteer requirements across the board. He will keep the Board informed. Commissioner Ward stated he got an e-mail from the Association Fire Districts and there is a registration cutoff of Friday for comments and to speak. He does believe they should take some kind of position on this. This does have an impact on the volunteer community and those concerned should be voiced. Chief Champion stated there have been a lot of safety standards that have been talked about being implemented over the years. Now it is actually coming down to putting that into law and following it. Commissioner Ward stated when he reads through this his take away is that they are

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taking NFPA standards, which are only standards, and making them laws. He understands the need for increase in standards and safety and training. The problem is finding the right balance. The impact to LaGrange is not as great but to districts that are all volunteers it is an impact. Chairman Komorsky stated the hourly training requirement will be an impact here as well. Commissioner Ward stated there also vehicle checks 24 hours after incidents and a lot of other things that will affect a lot of districts. He stated he understands the value of raising skill level but is unsure of the impacts moving forward.

- In County Training – Chief Champion stated they have discussed the 21-hour Fire Police class through Dutchess County Emergency Response. He did put a notification out to the membership and will be registering the interested individuals within the next week or so. Dave Bullock has restarted his reaffirmation of the interior and exterior training here to come online as a firefighter and EMT. Chief Champion would like to publicly thank the lieutenants for coming back and helping to coordinate and keep Dave on task in the training aspect.
- Out of County Training - Chief Champion stated there is no out of County training requests at this time. He just wanted to make note that the Ropes Tech class that was scheduled for Dutchess County was relocated to Orange County. There are two individuals were going to that class. It starts next week.
- Mechanical Status Updates - Chief Champion stated he included in a Teams folder for tonight a write up from the mechanical staff on where all of the apparatus stands and where the progression has been since the last meeting.

Chief Champion stated he received an invitation, along with anybody in Dutchess, Ulster, Orange, and Westchester that Hendrickson is having an open house this Thursday, September 26 at 12:30 PM at their Congers' facility. There is no need for reservations. Chairman Komorsky asked if anyone had expressed interest in going there. Chief Champion stated none of the line staff has expressed interest in going. He brought it up more for the Board's consideration. He does not anticipate any staff coming asking to go down.

- Mutual Aid - Chief Champion stated there is nothing to discuss on this item at this time.
- EMS - Chief Champion stated he drafted the letter for Chairman Komorsky, as the Chairman of the Board, to sign for Hudson Valley REMSCO in regard to the health commerce system for personnel access for himself and Lieutenant Merritt. He has not been able to move forward with posting the surplus ambulance on govdeals.com yet. He is hoping to take care of that before the next regularly scheduled meeting. Commissioner Ward asked what number he was putting on that and Chief Champion stated a number that will move it off of their property as speedily as possible. He will let the Board know when it goes up.
- Incidents of note - Chief Champion stated he is working in conjunction with the owner of Warlock Gym to get this recognition off the ground. For the October 8 meeting they will be

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having recognition for the lifesaving efforts by the five individuals at Warlock Gym. Two of those people were a PA and nurse from the general public and three from the coaching staff. There will also be recognition to LaGrange's staff responding in a timely fashion and bridged the continuation of care from initial to definitive. Chairman Komorsky asked if the Chief has followed up with the patient to see how he is doing. The Chief stated the patient will be here and so will County Executive Sue Serino offering a proclamation for those individuals. He has reached out to Hudson Valley News Network, specifically Todd Bender, who will be here to cover that event as well. He is also looking to recognize the efforts of Lagrange's crews internally for the lifesaving on Kavo Drive which happened towards the end of June. He is requesting this be the first task after the opening of the Board of Fire Commissioners meeting. Chairman Komorsky stated that he does believe these people should be recognized. It is excellent to have the County Executive as well as newspaper here to let the public know the efforts and extent that the staff goes to. He thanked the Chief for putting all of this together. Chief Champion stated he would like to go back to water rescue events and any other life-saving event that the Board would like to recognize at a future date. Chairman Komorsky stated he thought there was going to be something done for the people that participated at the high school. Chief Champion stated a lot of these events are stale events at this point. He is trying to determine who to bring in from the outside on some of these calls. The Chief is looking to capture all of these events at some point.

Chief Champion stated he did reach out to the locksmith for Stations 1 and 3 and he is waiting to hear back on what day it will be scheduled.

Chief Champion stated he has five personnel items for executive session and one contractual item.

- **Department** – Chairman Komorsky stated there was nothing to report.
- **Union** – There was nothing to report.

At 6:58 PM, upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Pignataro and SECONDED by Commissioner Sassi, the Board RESOLVED to go into Executive Session to discuss five personnel issues and one contractual item from Chief Champion, three personnel and one legal from Commissioner Sassi, and one contractual from the Board of Fire Commissioner. Sassi – Aye, Pignataro – Aye, Ward – Aye, Taft – Aye, Komorsky – Aye.
Motion carried.

OPEN SESSION:

At 8:59 PM, the Board resumed Open Session.

Chief Champion stated that he will be out of district from the 9th to the 16th and in November he will be out of the country after Thanksgiving.

FIREFIGHTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM
 AGREEMENT

This Agreement (“**Agreement**”) is made this first day of October 2024 (“**Effective Date**”) by and between MidHudson Regional Hospital of Westchester Medical Center, located at 1 Webster Avenue, Suite 400, Poughkeepsie, New York (“**The Work Place**”) and the Lagrange Fire District, located at 504 Freedom Plains Road, Poughkeepsie, New York (“**Company**”), to establish a Firefighter Assistance Program (“**FAP**”). The Work Place and Company may be referred to individual as a “Party” and together as the “Parties.”

The terms of the Agreement are as follows:

SCOPE AND OBJECTIVES:

1. The Work Place is retained by the Company to establish and administer the FAP, a confidential program that acts as a resource for work organizations and their firefighters. The FAP will provide certain prevention, identification, intervention, assessment, motivation to treatment, referral and follow-up services for Company’s firefighters and their immediate families.
2. The FAP is established to provide the Company’s firefighters and their families assistance with problems that can interfere with the firefighter’s ability to function on the job effectively, efficiently, and safely. These problems typically include, but are not limited to alcoholism, drug abuse, emotional, family, marital, financial and legal, etc.
3. **The primary FAP responsibilities of The Work Place are:**
 - a. The Work Place will provide training to Company firefighters with supervisory responsibilities to assist them in the identification of those firefighters who manifest deteriorating job performance and who do not respond to the Company’s normal supervisory counseling procedures. In addition, The Work Place will provide specific assistance, upon request, to Company members with supervisory responsibility in dealing with problems relating to deteriorating job performance by individual firefighters.
 - b. The Work Place will guide and assist those Company firefighters or a firefighter’s family member who are referred to the FAP by Company or who voluntarily seek assistance. It is the role of the FAP to assess the problem and recommend a course of treatment/action with the goal of restoring the firefighters’ capability to perform their job at an acceptable level of performance.
 - c. The Work Place will provide mutually agreed upon sessions to Company firefighters to provide on-going orientation and training seminars for the purpose of communicating the programs policies and procedures
 - d. The Work Place will assist the Company in promoting and maintaining an awareness of the FAP. The Work Place will provide certain publications, posters, and FAP cards.
 - e. The Work Place will encourage the Company firefighters to proceed with a course of assistance by referring the individual to clinical or supportive organizations and medical professionals, if applicable.
 - f. The Work Place will provide additional preventive workshops to Company managers, firefighters, and other family members for a maximum of two per year
 - g. The Work Place will provide follow-up to monitor referred firefighters’ adherence to the agreed course of treatment by submitting verbal progress reports to Company. Such reports will be limited to reporting whether or not the firefighter is cooperating with FAP recommendations related to firefighter work performance problems.
 - h. The Work Place maintains a 24-hour FAP hot line seven days a week available to participants in the FAP.
 - i. If requested, The Work Place may provide services not covered by this Agreement. Any such additional services and fees will be mutually agreed upon in advance and in writing by the Parties.

4. The primary FAP responsibilities of the Company are:

- a. The Company agrees to publicize the FAP program to its firefighters.
- b. The Company agrees to hold orientations, supervisory training and preventive workshops on company site or at a central offsite location designated by The Work Place.
- c. The Company will assist The Work Place with the implementation of the FAP, as may be requested.

TERM and TERMINATION:

5. The term of the Agreement shall be for a period of one year beginning on the Effective Date.
6. Either Party may terminate this Agreement without cause and without liability upon at least 7 days prior written notice to the other Party.
7. In the event of termination of this agreement:
 - a. The Work Place and the Company shall promptly review all work in progress. The Work Place shall be responsible only for any work commenced prior to the termination date. Company remains responsible for payment for services provided by Company after the date of termination, in the event such services are required to safely transition Company's employees to another provider of such FAP services. This provision will survive termination of this Agreement.
 - b. The Work Place will provide such services and assistance as may be reasonably necessary to transfer, in confidence, all records of services rendered and work in progress related to the performance by The Work Place under this Agreement, to any third Party mutually agreed to by the Company and The Work Place.
 - c. The Work Place may refund the Company any unused prepaid compensation within 90 days of termination of this Agreement.

CONFIDENTIALITY

8. The Work Place and the Company will adopt safeguards to assure that FAP services are conducted in a manner designed to preserve the privacy of Company firefighter and their families to assure that conversations and other contacts between The Work Place and firefighters and such individuals remain confidential.
9. The Parties shall abide by all federal and state law with respect to maintaining the confidentiality of patient information. The Parties agree to comply with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and associated regulations (HIPAA).
10. Each Party acknowledges and agrees that, in the course of performance under this Agreement, it may have access to certain confidential information, including but not limited to, trade secrets, policies, procedures, operating manuals, utilization and quality assurance programs, software, marketing techniques, contractual arrangements, patient information, price lists, pricing policies and other business and financial information ("Confidential Information"). Each Party shall maintain the confidentiality of all such Confidential Information belonging to the other Party and shall not divulge such information to any third Parties, except as otherwise provided for under this Agreement and under law. This provision survives termination of this Agreement.

FEES AND PAYMENTS:

11. For the services provided under this Agreement, Company will compensate The Work Place an amount equal to \$24.00 per firefighter annually.
12. The Work Place will provide Company written invoices which are due and payable within 10 days of receipt by Company. In addition to all remedies allowed under law, The Work Place may suspend services or terminate this Agreement in the event payment is not made in a timely manner.

INDEMNIFICATION:

13. The Company will indemnify The Work Place and hold The Work Place harmless from any losses, claims, damages or liabilities, joint or several, to which The Work Place might become subject insofar as such losses, claims, damages or liabilities arising out of this Agreement or are based upon any actions of the Company, its agents or employees and will reimburse The Work Place for any legal or other expenses, reasonably incurred by The Work Place, in connection with any action or claim. This provision will survive termination of this Agreement.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- 14. This Agreement and all exhibits represent the entire agreement between the Parties regarding the subject matter of this Agreement, and no other representations or agreements, oral or otherwise, shall be of any force or effect. This Agreement may be amended only by the mutual written agreement of duly authorized representatives of both Parties specifically referencing this Agreement. The unenforceability or invalidity of any provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity and enforceability of the remainder of this Agreement, unless such unenforceability or invalidity would materially change the Parties' relationship. The waiver by either Party of any one or more defaults or contract violations on the part of the other shall not be construed to operate as a waiver of any other or future defaults or contract violations.
- 15. No Party shall be deemed to be in violation of this Agreement if it is prevented from performing any of its obligations for reasons beyond its control, including but not limited to, acts of God or of the public enemy, war, terrorism, flood, storm, strikes or law or actions of any federal, state or local government.
- 16. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties, their successors and permitted assigns. The rights, obligations and privileges of this Agreement may not be assigned, delegated or transferred by one Party without the written consent of the other Party; provided that either Party may assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party to a subsidiary or affiliate that is wholly owned by or under common control of the assignor.
- 17. This Agreement is intended only to benefit the named Parties, and there is no intent to create any rights, interests or benefits for any other third Party.
- 18. Company and The Work Place are independent contractors, and neither Party, nor any agent, employee or representative of such Party, shall be deemed to be an employee of the other Party. This Agreement shall not be construed to create any partnership, joint venture, lease or equity relationship, expressly or by implication, between the Parties. Each Party shall have sole responsibility for the reporting and payment of these taxes for its own respective employees.
- 19. Neither Party, nor any of its employees performing services under this Agreement have been debarred, suspended, declared ineligible or excluded from Medicare/Medicaid or any other federal or state healthcare program. Both Parties agree to promptly notify the other Party of any limitation or governmental action initiated against it that would materially affect this Agreement.
- 20. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New York, regardless of conflict of laws provisions. Only the federal or state courts located in Westchester County, New York shall have jurisdiction to hear any dispute under this Agreement. In the event any provision of this Agreement is held to be unenforceable for any reason, the unenforceability thereof shall not affect the remainder of this Agreement, which shall remain in full force and effect and enforceable in accordance with its terms. This provision will survive termination or expiration of this Agreement
- 21. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts which, when taken together, will constitute one original, and photocopy, facsimile, electronic or other copies shall have the same effect for all purposes as an ink-signed original.
