CORRESPONDENCE:

- There was a check from New York State Department of Health for reimbursement of an EMT recertification in the amount of \$300.00.
- There was a check from Oklahoma State University for a returned book in the amount \$157.00.

- **Station 1 Building Update**– Commissioner Ward stated he had sent out a note on two change orders that they approved that were within the allowances for that work. They have the approval from the last meeting for the asbestos plan, so that visit should have happened last week. They should receive that report back within the next week or two.

- Station 3 Storage Room – Commissioner Ward stated this is still a work in progress.
- Station 2 Septic - Commissioner Tierney said there were three documents in the Board’s packet. The first thing he discussed was the engineering report. It was sent to the Board of Health, as required. They do need the Board of Health to sign off on the requested waivers. They are for the separation of the absorption fields between the property boundaries, the separation of the slope – the 15% and the distance, the 15% slope is within 35 feet. These are the things they have asked for so they do not have to bring in additional fill. Chairman Komorsky stated he is optimistic that these will be approved and they will just need to do a little excavation on the hill. Commissioner Tierney stated there is another section of the report that talks about all of the components in great detail. Once the BOH approves this, they will be able to move on to the next step. They will be able to go out for estimates. Commissioner Ward asked if there was an engineering estimate and Commissioner Tierney said they have not done that for the whole build. They want to get the BOH approval first. Commissioner Tierney stated the second piece is the layout of the plan itself. The first page is what exists today. The second page is what they are proposing. The fields are a little bigger. There is a stanchion area. The last page has some pertinent details regarding the tanks, pump station, etc. He did not have them add any of the drainage. The last form is what had to be signed. They say it should be two to four weeks once it is submitted. They are continuing to do pump outs two times a week.
- Station 2 Brick Pointing – Commissioner Tierney stated due to the rain, they pushed it out a week. The vendor will be here next Monday.
- Staffing Community Events – Deputy Chief Zittel stated June 14 is LaGrange Community Day from 9 AM to 10 PM. Traditionally they do one ambulance with two people and one engine with two people for the duration and through the fireworks. There was a Touch a Truck event at Acorn to Oaks that went very well.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Pignataro and SECONDED by Commissioner Tierney, the Board RESOLVED to approve participation of manpower and equipment at the June 14 LaGrange Community Day. Pignataro – Aye, Taft -Aye, Tierney –Aye, Ward – Aye, Chairman Komorsky - Aye. Motion Carried.

- Lexipol Policy Updates – Deputy Chief Zittel stated this is still in process. Commissioner Ward stated Chief Champion had sent out a few policies for the Board to review, but he has not fully reviewed it. Chairman Komorsky stated this is a work in progress.
- Operational Software Overview – Deputy Chief Zittel stated they went live on the 1st with NIFRS entries in First Due and they are continuing to move forward. Commissioner Ward stated he believed they had captured most of the data from that which was static and all the information has been sent to the current vendor. The fire house software stuff is still dynamic so they still have to figure out what that update is. They will have to wait for Chief Champion to come back to see where they are with that. Mr. Lenkowski stated they have frozen Fire House as of two months ago. That export should be current and it was provided to First Due, but he does not know where they are with it. The Chief had mentioned that there was some information still missing so he is doing another check to see where things are. Commissioner Ward stated that the only one that is dynamic is ESO. Mr. Lenkowski stated ESO will be migrating over. Commissioner Ward stated

they are still going to continue to use ESO for the PCR's. Chairman Komorsky asked if there was a backup for all the data just in case something gets lost in the transfer. Mr. Lenkowski stated everything is still in place and they still have full access between ESO and Fire House.

Commissioner Ward stated they have numerous systems involved and everything is backed up. Chairman Komorsky stated that is what makes him nervous and he is afraid something will fall through the cracks. Mr. Lenkowski stated the issue right now is the total record numbers don't match. They are going through things to figure out where things are missing. Commissioner Taft asked when they could start seeing the reports and Commissioner Ward stated that is what they are working on right now. It is in process. There were several systems and databases that they were collecting data from to feed to First Due. In addition to that Firehouse Software has stopped. They are pretty much down to just using First Due and ESO for PCRs. They don't have a date yet. Secretary Le stated they started looking at reports and there is not enough data in First Due yet to pull out information. Mr. Lenkowski stated that First Due's go live date was three weeks ago. All of the data migration and reports were supposed to be all in by then. Commissioner Ward stated he never believed that date for a minute. Mr. Lenkowski stated First Due is still committed to making their reports identical to what they have now. Commissioner Pignataro asked if all of the historical data should really be in First Due. Commissioner Ward stated that the data has been sent to them but now they have to reconcile that all of the information is complete. He stated that the historical data has not been vetted to make sure that it is accurate yet. It has been sent to them but is not actually entered. They have only been using the system for nine months so there is not enough entered data to have meaningful reports.

- Diesel Tank Accessories – Deputy Chief Zittel stated the monthly inspections are occurring and they are waiting for an update on work they are still waiting for.
- Grant update – Deputy Chief Zittel stated they are waiting on an updated status for the SAFER Grant. They will resume filing as soon as a determination is given. The first rig is scheduled to go out on 11th of June and the second on 16th of June for the lettering for the County grant. Commissioner Ward asked Treasurer Pozniak where the sunset is on the SAFER Grant. He does know it has been extended for a number of reasons. Treasurer Pozniak stated he believes the grant ran through February but they should have funding that will take them through the end of this year. It was for nine staff members and they did hire nine people from day one. They think there will be funding through this calendar year. Commissioner Ward asked if they should assume zero for 2026 and Treasurer Pozniak said yes. He stated that is where they will take the money they set aside and apply it.
- Grant Writing Update – Deputy Chief Zittel stated there was nothing new at this time.
- Building Repairs/Repair Requests – Chairman Komorsky asked if there was anything needing to be discussed that had not been discussed already. There was nothing.

NEW BUSINESS:

There was no new business at this time.

REPORTS: (by officers present)

- **Treasurer Pozniak** - Treasurer Pozniak stated he had nothing tonight. He asked if there would be a meeting next week or in two weeks. Secretary Le stated the regularly scheduled meetings for June were on the 10th and on the 24th. This was a delayed meeting from last week. The Board decided they will keep the regular June meeting dates. Chairman Komorsky stated he did not believe he would be available for the June 10th meeting. Treasurer Pozniak will have a report for the next meeting.

- **Chief Anthony Champion's Report was combined with Deputy Chief Zittel's and presented by Deputy Chief Zittel.**
 - o Member status -Deputy Chief Zittel stated there are no new members at this time.

 - o Civil Service -Deputy Chief Zittel stated the request went out for the part-time fire equipment mechanic. The part-time position was created and did go out to advertise. There have currently been no replies.

 - o In County Training -Deputy Chief Zittel stated they had accreditation on Friday the 16th. It went well.

 - o Out of County Training -Deputy Chief Zittel stated there a Nonmotorized Boat Operator Specialist class in Oriskany at the State Preparedness Center on the June 16th to the 18th and July 29th. On the 16th it is Captain Ryan and Deputy Chief Zittel. Firefighter Rand is waitlisted for the class. On the 29th, Firefighter Wells and Firefighter Tambini will be attending.

 - o Equipment - Deputy Chief Zittel stated the update from Captain Demilto regarding mechanical equipment is that all of the testing was completed this year for the hose, pumps, the ladders, extinguishers, and the Scott packs. Everything is good. The Chief did e-mail the Board a quote for 47-11 regarding the transmission work. It is a cost of \$26,429.33. Chairman Komorsky asked if there was any warranty coming with this and Deputy Chief Zittel said no. Commissioner Pignataro asked when the warranty expired and Deputy Chief Zittel stated it was approximately 8 months ago. Commissioner Ward stated they need to get it repaired so they need to move forward on this. They can try to negotiate some reprieve on the warranty later. Chairman Komorsky stated he did ask Captain Demilto to call about it, and he did. It is just not the news they were hoping for.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to approve the repairs for 47-11 at a cost of \$26,429.33. Pignataro – Aye, Taft -Aye, Tierney –Aye, Ward – Aye, Chairman Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

- o Updates -Deputy Chief Zittel stated the graduation from Utica is June 26th and there are two members there. July 11th will be the Westchester Fire Academy graduation.

- Deputy Chief Zittel stated he has two personnel items for Executive Session.
- **Deputy Chief of EMS** – Deputy Chief Merritt stated the National Fire Academy re-opened last week. The Board had previously approved to send up to four members for a QAQI class. Unfortunately, a lot of the classes were canceled and this was one of those. He does plan to bring it forward to the Board again when it becomes available. Commissioner Ward asked if he knew who taught that and the Deputy Chief said no. Chairman Komorsky asked what the reason for the cancellation of all the classes was and the Deputy Chief stated it was due to the Department of Government Efficiency shut down the National Fire Academy and they just started reopening. Commissioner Tierney stated that the Lexipol representative is an instructor. Deputy Chief Merritt stated they do host a lot of classes for the fire service, EMS, and other disciplines.

Last month Dutchess County held a Tactical Emergency Casualty class that was free. They were approved to send up to three people. One of them got waitlisted and could not attend because the class filled up so rapidly. The two members who went said it was great training. The Center for Disaster Medicine is the program that hosted the class and they are out of Westchester County. The Deputy Chief believes they host six classes a year. They do have one coming up in July. It is a three-day class from 8 AM to 5 PM for 25 hours total. The cost of the course \$525 per person. He is requesting approval to send up to two people. It is in Valhalla.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Ward and SECONDED by Commissioner Pignataro, the Board RESOLVED to approve two members to attend the Center for Disaster Medicine training class in July for \$525 per person. Pignataro – Aye, Taft -Aye, Tierney –Aye, Ward – Aye, Chairman Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Deputy Chief Merritt stated recently there was a news article in the Pine Plains Herald. It has been circulating online. It referenced a chart from the County's 2025 first quarter data for Dutchess County supplemental ambulance service. It shows that LaGrange has 87% of their priority one calls on scene within 9 minutes. They are among the best in the County. He wanted to highlight what that means for two high acuity calls they had. In late April shortly before midnight they responded to a male in his mid-50s possibly not breathing. The crew arrived on the scene in just over 8 minutes and found a patient on the floor unconscious with an unstable airway. The paramedics quickly suspected a stroke and identified an airway compromise and it would probably not be survivable. They sedated and intubated the patient and transported to the emergency room. The total time with the patient from dispatch to in the hospital was just over 45 min. The follow-up from the hospital says that the patient suffered a stroke but has improved significantly since then. He has been extubated. The crew did a fantastic job. The crew was Tambini, Martell, Higham, Wern, Ryan, Hildenbrand, Whalen, and Cummings. Chairman Komorsky congratulated the crew and asked that he convey that to the members.

Deputy Chief Merritt stated the second call he would like to highlight was at approximately 2:30 in the afternoon in late May. The crew responded to a male having chest pains who was in and out of consciousness. The crew got there in 4 minutes. They found the patient cool, pale, and diaphoretic and losing consciousness. Based on his presentation they identified he was having a heart attack. Within 5 minutes of their arrival they had notified the emergency room, transmitted an EKG, started an IV, gave him aspirin and medications to stabilize his blood pressure and administered oxygen. They then transported to the hospital. The patient was

turned over to the emergency room within 33 minutes from the time of dispatch. They arrived before the Cath Lab was even reopened for them. Generally, when the hospital receives the EKG they call people to reopen the Cath Lab on weekends, which is what they did. That crew was Wern, Martell, Higham, and Rand. This was another absolutely fantastically run call. Commissioner Ward stated this is why you don't give your EMS to a third-party service. Deputy Chief Merritt stated it also is not just response time, which is what the County is focusing on. It is also a matter of having skilled, qualified crews responding to these emergencies. These guys are doing an outstanding job. Chairman Komorsky stated he feels this is the best EMS system by far in the County and possibly in multiple counties. Commissioner Pignataro asked how they calculate the four-minute response, and who is keeping track of it, and when does it begin, and when does it end. Deputy Chief Merritt stated you can track it from the time of dispatch to when they respond but the Deputy Chief looks at it from when they received a call from 911 to when the District calls out responding. The clock starts from the second they get that tone until they call on scene. Commissioner Ward stated what you don't know is how long it took on the phone to the 911 center. Commissioner Pignataro stated he understands that but they have no control over that aspect. Chairman Komorsky asked that on behalf of the Board of Fire Commissioners he thank the crews. This was very well done. Commissioner Tierney stated they did talk about doing something for recognition at the end of the year but he does believe they should do something sooner. He asked the Deputy Chief to come back with a recommendation for some sort of possibly monthly or quarterly recognition. Deputy Chief Merritt stated he will discuss it with Deputy Chief Zittel. He does think it is a good idea. Chairman Komorsky stated he feels a monthly basis would be a little too onerous. The Deputy Chief stated they will come up with an idea and come back to the Board. Commissioner Pignataro stated they need to make sure there is no conflict with the CBU in terms of recognition. Deputy Chief Merritt stated the District has not traditionally done recognition but the Union does do one at the end of each year. Commissioner Ward stated when they had the department dinner they used to do recognitions at that. That is something that stopped approximately 15 years ago. Deputy Chief Merritt stated that is something that the chief staff has been discussing the last few months.

- **Department** –Chairman Komorsky stated there was no one present.
- **Union** – There was no report.

Commissioner Tierney stated handouts had been given to the Board. He feels they need some planning workshops. They need to start prepping for next year's budget. Commissioner Ward had given some prices regarding the inflation on trucks. They should probably get together and have some of these discussions. Commissioner Ward stated he has already taking into account the inflation factor. The real issue is that they had discussed meeting every other month or on a quarterly basis and it is time to do that. To do it during one of the regular meetings it will not get the justice that it needs. Chairman Komorsky stated he feels all the commissioners should be involved in that and Commissioner Ward agreed. Commissioner Ward stated some of the things on the financial side that came to mind is they had conservatively estimated their revenues associated with the EMS cost recovery. He does believe they have enough information to have a better track record of what that is. In addition, with the EMS cost recovery service there are options that they have in terms of setting rates.

He does believe they should review that as well. He does not believe they have done that since it was set up. He will get with the Treasurer before that so some of the completed prep work is done and they can have discussions. Commissioner Tierney stated they could also look at rates some other districts are using as well. Commissioner Pignataro stated he thought the reimbursement rates were set by Medicare. Commissioner Ward stated they are but there are options that they had in terms of the rates they could select. They do need to revisit it. He asked Treasurer Pozniak if he had access to that data. Treasurer Pozniak stated he only has access to the reports and they can probably get the rates together. The Medicare rates are fixed. There are differences for the private insurances and what they bill them. It is sort of a reflection of what the Medicare rates are but they were not the same. Commissioner Ward stated there may not be a lot of latitude there but they should revisit it.

Commissioner Tierney stated they had mentioned they were going to have a workshop to review the policies and procedures to move those along. The representative recommended that they have workshops with the commissioners and command staff to run through the policies and get them done. It does not have to be at night, it could be during the day.

Chairman Komorsky asked that he stay in touch and keep everyone informed.

Commissioner Tierney stated some staff would love to use the exercise room upstairs and the one at Station 1. They need to decide if they need to get new equipment or move some things around. He would like a house committee to decide what they would like to do with the exercise equipment. Chairman Komorsky asked if any of this was a priority right now.

Commissioner Tierney stated that from the number of stretching issues they are having with the firefighters they may want to bump it up a little bit. Commissioner Ward stated with the equipment they have they have not had an excessively high usage. There used to be just one or two people who would use it. That may have changed in the last few years but historically it did not have a lot of use. Chairman Komorsky asked firefighter Ryan if that was a priority for him right at this time. Firefighter Ryan stated it is not a top priority right now. He knows it was mentioned about Station 1's backroom having something done but he does not think anybody wants it to be done right away. Chairman Komorsky stated they could hold off on that for a little while. Commissioner Ward stated this could fall under Phase 2 at Station 1. They do not have a plan for that because they did not have a designated usage of the old ready room area. That can be part of this discussion. Commissioner Tierney stated that brings up the question of what is their next step. Once they get the septic priced out and they know what their budget is and once they finish the Station 1 work, then they have to determine what will be next.

Commissioner Ward stated they have already created a list for each year. A lot of the stuff that was listed for 2025 is not going to happen in 2025. His suggestion would be that they take that list and spread it out over time to see what is reasonable and add to it the things that are new since the last time they had that discussion. Commissioner Tierney asked if that would require two workshops and Commissioner Ward stated he believed it could all be done in one. He does believe they need to discuss the land and building reserve funds and the vehicles altogether. The vehicles will be straightforward as they are already defined. It is just a matter of applying the new base rates based upon what he received from the people at Hendrikson and the new inflation rate. The land and building reserve already has a list created and they just need to determine whether or not they will do the items. Chairman Komorsky stated in the past when they have brought up all of these different projects sometimes they did not get done because the wish list kept going on. His personal choice would be that they concentrate on the big jobs that they have going, like the septic, until they are completed. He wants to make sure

that they complete what they have started. Commissioner Tierney stated he will work with Secretary Le to send out some dates that they can choose for a workshop. Commissioner Tierney stated that the painting of the steel on the doors and the outside is done. The brick work will be worked on Tuesday. The Board had asked for a quote on the painting of the doors at Station 3. He did get that. It came in at \$2500. Chairman Komorsky stated he would like to get a few quotes. Commissioner Tierney stated he can do that. Commissioner Ward asked what that involves and if it was an acid wash and end paint. Commissioner Tierney stated it has to be sanded on both sides and have the steel washed. Commissioner Ward stated he just wanted to be sure that the quotes are the same scope. Chairman Komorsky stated he will take care of getting another price. Commissioner Tierney stated some of the doors took five coats because the old color bleeds through. Commissioner Tierney stated that the blocks are sinking on the back porch. He is still getting quotes on that.
