MINUTES BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS Regular Meeting Tuesday, July 14, 2026

At 6:00 PM, Chairman Komorsky called the Board of Fire Commissioners Regular Meeting to order for Tuesday July 14th, 2026, and led the Pledge of Allegiance. He welcomed everyone to the meeting. Chairman Komorsky stated for the record that the Board of Fire Commissioners felt that their meetings had been too detailed with reporting so they were going to start streamlining them to cut back the amount of time the meetings were taking as they were staying until 11:00 PM regularly. No information will be withheld from anybody but they do not need to go into the minute details.

MINUTES: - 6/23/26 Regular Meeting

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Taft, the Board RESOLVED to approve the 6/23/26 Regular Meeting minutes. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

CORRESPONDENCE: -

- A letter from Dianne Weber was received. It was regarding an EMS call that was dispatched to Empress and LaGrange was called in to assist with manpower and they were very appreciative of the crew from LaGrange that assisted. The crew for that call was Firefighter/Paramedic Matthew Bourne, and Firefighter/EMTs Rob Wells and Casey Higham. Chairman Komorsky asked that a copy of this letter go into their files. He stated they have greatly trained staff and the LaGrange community are in good hands.
- A thank you card from Janet and Carl Hein with a check made out to the LaGrange Fire Department. A thank you note will be sent for that. The thank you card was for the help they have received. Secretary Le stated there have been a few calls to that residence. Firefighter/Paramedic Matthew Bourne, Firefighter/ EMT Michael Mendez, Firefighter/Paramedic Thomas Cummings, Firefighter/EMT Owen Thomas, Firefighter/EMT Jose Andrade, and Firefighter/Paramedic Diann Hackett were all responders to those calls. Chairman Komorsky asked that copies of that letter be put into their files as well.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Taft, the Board RESOLVED to approve giving the donation check to the Department. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

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OLD BUSINESS/UNRESOLVED ITEMS:

- Station 1 Building Update – Commissioner Tierney stated tile will be here by the end of this week. They are going to install it starting on Monday. The bathroom should be completed by next Friday. They will do a walk through afterwards to make sure everything is fine. Before they do the final payout they will do a final walk through. They did finish the air flow report and it all looks good. For executive session he has three items related to the construction/legal. He read the following list: Meyers was approved at the last meeting for approximately \$4300 so that is closed and done. He has been working with Bria and Jen on the paint. They need to pay the painter \$3298.08 for some doors and the outside and they are not paying for a lot of the other painting. Chairman Komorsky asked Commissioner Kaiser if that was OK because they have had some issue with the doors. Commissioner Kaiser asked exactly what the \$3000 was for. Commissioner Tierney stated it is for the doors and the outside wall. Commissioner Kaiser stated his question with the outside wall is that Meyer had to bust through the block to put new windows in and the building was not repainted. He asked if that was part of the project and Commissioner Tierney said no. Commissioner Kaiser stated once again the engineer did not include painting the exterior of the building after they smashed through the block. Chairman Komorsky stated he would like to withhold funds on that one. Commissioner Kaiser stated if the outside of the building had to be painted they are stuck for the cost of that, but he does not understand why it was not part of the project. The second part is the doors. The doors were not prepped right and the day after they were painted, the paint started peeling off the doors. Commissioner Tierney stated there are three doors that were painted and there is paint peeling off of one of them. Chairman Komorsky stated the bottom of one of the other doors was peeling off as well. Chairman Komorsky stated he has a problem with the fact that they knew they had to breakthrough the wall and it should have been included in the plan. Commissioner Tierney stated he is fine withholding off on paying for any of the paint if they want to go up against CPL, as these were not things included in the original bid. He stated the reason why he painted it was because after the construction guys did the installation he was told that the outside cinder blocks were not painted so when it rained there would be seepage into the building. Chairman Komorsky asked the Board what they would like to do. Commissioner Kaiser stated that Meyers came in and did their part. Then the other trades came in and busted everything up and ruined ceiling tiles and dinged up the walls. He stated that a lot of it should be put back on Meyers because it was not a good job and there was a lot of patchwork to do on their end, but there was other damage from other contractors in there as well. Next time they will have to be sure that if someone comes in and does work after painting is done that they can go after that vendor if they do damage to that painting. They don't know which vendor broke up the wall. No one was on site to be in charge of the project, so they need to make sure that they do this better for the next project. Commissioner Taft asked if anyone has reached out to the painter to inform him he has to come back and repaint it. Commissioner Tierney stated he will do that. Commissioner Kaiser stated the other doors have been there for 50 years and the paint has never peeled. These were painted and within a week were peeling. Commissioner Tierney suggested not paying for anything to do with the paint until he speaks to the vendor about coming in to fix it. Commissioner Tierney stated the electrical is all done and there are no issues. They are owed \$7721.27.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Chairman Komorsky, the Board RESOLVED to approve payment to the

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electrician in the amount of \$7,721.27. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Commissioner Tierney stated the HVAC vendor followed the specifications. The noise is not their fault. Chairman Komorsky asked if that was the one that Michael recommended and Commissioner Tierney said yes. The final bill for them is \$27,170.00.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Taft, the Board RESOLVED to approve payment to the HVAC vendor in the amount of \$27,170. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Commissioner Tierney stated the plumber is finished in the basement at a total cost of \$1133.35. He stated they are holding \$38,904.00 from the plumbers until they get the bathroom done.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Kaiser, the Board RESOLVED to approve payment to the plumber vendor in the amount of \$1133.35. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Commissioner Tierney stated he has MJ listed for the septic for \$1708.50. Secretary Le stated that is for the septic project and everyone should have a copy of the e-mail. Commissioner Kaiser stated this is for Station 2.

Upon a MOTION made by Chairman Komorsky and SECONDED by Commissioner Kaiser, the Board RESOLVED to approve payment to MJ the in the amount of \$1708.50. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Taft and SECONDED by Commissioner Kaiser, the Board RESOLVED to approve payment to the JC Land in the amount of \$21,295.30. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Commissioner Tierney stated everyone had a copy in their file of the emergency repairs for the parapet roof. It also guarantees the 20 year membrane on it as well. The company is WTI and it is for a contract price of \$8,762.70. He stated the Chairman Komorsky would need to sign the contract and return it.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Chairman Komorsky, the Board RESOLVED to approve the proposal from WTI for the parapet repair in the amount of \$8,762.70. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

Jeff Lenkowski asked if a move in date had been set for Station 1 yet. Commissioner Tierney stated they have not set the move in date yet. They have to wait for the plumber and then do the final walkthrough. They also have to get the CO from the Town.

- Station 1 Phase 2 Update – Commissioner Taft stated he spoke to the contractor and he is waiting on the electrician who is overwhelmed with the storm damage right now. He is hoping to get him out there later this week.

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- Station 2 Septic - Chairman Komorsky stated the septic was completed and working. This can now be removed from the agenda.
- Station 2 Brick & Roof Repair – Chairman Komorsky stated they have already discussed the roof repair with the proposal from WTI. Commissioner Tierney stated they found the steel shelf. There was significant corrosion. Anyone can go see it through the Chief's office. They did ground the I-beam down. It is not any more than 25% so they do not have to do anything more with that because it is good. Chairman Komorsky asked if it was galvanized and Commissioner Tierney said no. There has been a discussion between the engineer, Matt, and the steel guy and they have stated that they agree that there are two pieces of steel that they are going to stitch weld and it will hold up. He is trying to get a bill from them.
- Station 2 Emergency Generator Assessment - Chairman Komorsky stated they had another generator company in today that will be giving a proposal as well. As soon as they get the third proposal it will be reviewed by Nick at MJ and then they will be able to move forward with a decision. Commissioner Tierney stated when they were walking out back today the generator made a weird noise and then shut off. The Chief was going to check on it. Chairman Komorsky stated there is an issue with the switch that he is aware of. They do not need to replace that switch if they are getting a new generator. They do have a workaround for that because Caterpillar has already been here to look at it.
- Stations 1 & 3 Water Testing – Commissioner Kaiser the water testing is complete. They shocked the wells and the testing came back negative. There are no heavy metals showing up at either station. They just have hard water. They still have hard water and they are going to put the softeners and UV lights in at Station 1 and 3. They are waiting for Steve Turner. It is on his schedule to get it done. Commissioner Tierney asked if a UV light was required for buildings with the showers. Chairman Komorsky stated it will be done before they move back in. Chairman Komorsky stated since that will be done soon he believes it can be taken off of the agenda as well.
- Staffing Community Events – There will be no report in Chief Champion's absence.
- Lexipol Policy Updates – There will be no report in Chief Champion's absence.
- Grant Update – Chairman Komorsky stated they are getting support letters from various politicians both at a state and local level. Hopefully those will go a long way and they will get a portion of the AFG grant.
- Grant Writing Update – Chairman Komorsky stated they also had a bill against the purchase order for the assistance on the grant writing that was in the packet to be signed off on tonight.
- Town of LaGrange Board Meeting Update - Chairman Komorsky stated the information is in their packet. There are a few things they should be aware of. The most important one is in regard to the Planning Board meeting on Thursday night. It is the Rieger Town Center development. There is also another one regarding Taconic Commons. That is for the three story storage facility. When this project came before the Town Board it was standing room only

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at the meeting. They were people that lived on Arthursburg Road and in that area that objected to this three story change in zoning because this is in what is considered a Gateway Hamlet. A Gateway Hamlet has very specific laws and codes as to what is allowed to be in there. A Gateway Hamlet is considered an entrance into the town. There are special codes due to a grant from the county years ago for the town to come up with codes and zoning laws on what is allowed at the entrances to various towns. Chairman Komorsky, Ed Jessup, Alan Bell, and Ken McLaughlin made the codes for the Gateway Hamlets for the Town of LaGrange many years ago. They want to change the zoning for this applicant for Taconic Commons for a three story self-storage and it is not allowable by the code. Commissioner Taft questioned why this is being referred to the town planning if the Town Board are the ones that create the town codes. Chairman Komorsky stated there is an existing relationship between the applicant and the town and that may have been why it was referred to the Planning Board. It was the attorney's suggestion to refer it to the Planning Board. He feels it is important because on Thursday nights the Planning Board is going to make the decision and the referral back to the Town Board to approve or disapprove changing the town code. Chairman Komorsky's concern is that the Planning Board will have no problem with it and the Town Board will go ahead and approve the change in the code. Chairman Komorsky feels there is a conflict with this. It affects the Fire District as they do not have a ladder truck. Historically there are 1,400 to 1,500 fires every year in self-storage facilities nationwide. People store dangerous things in there and this would be in a residential area with one way in and one way out to that neighborhood. This would be very dangerous for those neighboring properties since people store flammables or explosive items in those storage facilities. He feels they are not suited for this and it should not be in this area. He feels they should have representation at the meeting even though they cannot speak to it as it is not a public comment hearing. Commissioner Taft stated it is listed as being referred to the Planning Board for discussion and recommendation only. The Planning Board can recommend something but the Town Board is still going to be the ultimate decision maker as to whether or not they changed the zoning. Chairman Komorsky feels it is important for them to have representation there as it is a public safety issue. Chairman Komorsky stated the other important issue to remember is there is a creek and wetlands right behind there as well. Chairman Komorsky stated they have already let the Town Board know their opinion of this on the record. His opinion is that it never should have been sent to the Planning Board to begin with. Commissioner Kaiser stated with the Gateway Hamlet there are certain standards they have to go by. The Town Board could just say it is against the Gateway Hamlet code but they are not doing that. This is Thursday night and he, Commissioner Kaiser and the Chief will be attending this meeting

Chairman Komorsky stated the second issue is on the Town Board meeting, which is Wednesday night. It is the Town Center Rieger Development Plan. He wants everyone to understand that when he was on the Planning Board, long buildings that were commercial and residential had to have firewalls. Since the changeover on the Planning Board it has changed. At the last meeting he and the Chief asked about the firewalls and they were told no. There are sprinklers so they don't have to worry about firewalls. That becomes an issue because if there is a fire in that building it will go straight down the roof line as it has nothing to stop it. Chairman Komorsky believes they should be at the meeting for this one as well to listen to any other changes that have been made in the recent past. If maybe they can write a letter to the Town Board to express their concerns because it was not like this in the past. Commissioner Tierney stated Lexington Plaza looks like it has firewalls but it does not. They are fake.

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Chairman Komorsky stated this one has no firewalls. He cares about the fire district staff members who will be going in. Commissioner Kaiser stated he feels it is sad that in December they had a meeting on this for the town to speak and there were hundreds and hundreds of people and there were four hours of people asking questions and they were told every question had to be answered. They supposedly answered the questions but did not tell anyone they answered the questions. It is now on the internet somewhere but the town Planning Board and the Town Board never let anyone know that the answers were there. The Fire District got up and asked numerous questions and we never knew that the report came out answering those questions. Commissioner Taft stated the law requires they answer the questions but they don't have to tell everyone where those answers are. Chairman Komorsky stated there was a 68 page response, which he read. When he was at the Planning Board meeting with the Chief, the Chairman, Randy Aldrige, brought up the report and asked if everyone read it and nobody on the Board reacted, and he stated he has no objections with any of the answers. There were over 200 questions and concerns from the public and the answers were given and the Planning Board members had no problem with any of those responses. He stated he has concerns about this. This is why he feels the Fire District needs to be involved and goes to these meetings. It did not appear that anyone else on the Planning Board even read it. Commissioner Tierney asked when they pull the lever on the special taxing district. Chairman Komorsky stated they would need to do that when the project is approved and the map is filed. That would hold things up for three months as they create the special tax district. Firefighter/Medic Tom Martell stated it is hard to file an Article 78. The District has already hired an attorney group to do that. They have to let the process run its course. When the Chief brought up his questions he was told that the answers are in the report. They did not have give each individual their answers. Chairman Komorsky stated that he is talking about filing an Article 78 to create a special taxing district only. FF/Medic Martell stated he is familiar with Union Vale and not LaGrange. He stated they are nowhere near close to approving this. This is just the initial discussions. It is a long process and he stated his concern is that they need to stay focused on the fire safety aspect of it in regard to not having a ladder truck. They do have a concern about storing gasoline in it but there are gas stations right up the street in East Fishkill. They need to focus on the fact that self-storage units have fires and they don't have a ladder truck for a facility like this. Chairman Komorsky stated he just wanted to enlighten the Board members on the actions that are going on right now.

Chief Champion arrived at 6:43 PM.

Chairman Komorsky stated Chief Champion had just arrived. He informed the Chief that he has given the update on the grant writing and verified that Chief Champion had nothing that needed to be added to that. Chief Champion stated Lexipol update could come off of the agenda moving forward. Chairman Komorsky asked if there was anything that needed to be updated on staffing community events and Chief Champion stated not at this time.

- Building Repairs/Repair Requests – Chairman Komorsky asked if there were any issues that had not yet been discussed. Commissioner Kaiser stated he wanted to give a shout out to Martell for watering the trees and Captain DeMillo for setting up a sprinkler system. He also wanted to thank Firefighters Andrade and Thomas for all of the time they spent on the property mowing and weed whacking the other day. They even scraped out the brickwork by the

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highway. The property looks very good. Chairman Komorsky stated on behalf of the Board, he wanted to thank all of them for a great job.

NEW BUSINESS: *(none)*

REPORTS: *(by officers present)*

○ **Treasurer Pozniak**

Treasurer Pozniak was not present so there was no report.

○ **Chief Anthony Champion**

- **Membership** – Chief Champion stated there are preliminary discussions for the company that purchased radios for its members. He defined parameters and those parameters will be presented to the company at their next regular meeting. He will then come back to the Board when that discussion is concluded. There is a member that is returning from leave and is undergoing the firefighter returned to work checklist and onboarding. Additional information can be supplied during executive session.
- **Civil Service** - Chief Champion stated they are in the process of moving forward in the process with five out of the 9 candidates that were interviewed last week. They have physicals lined up and are submitting background checks for arson and fingerprinting. Civil Service has a cache of MT222 Forms for positions and he is waiting upon their review and comment back. He did receive communication from civil service for a certificate of eligibility for the positions of Deputy Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief of EMS. That will be discussed further during executive session.
- **Training** - Chief Champion stated there is a Dangerous Spaces Challenge and Tactics with Garage and Basement Fires class that is being held on September 22nd from 18:30 to 22:00 hours and the cost is \$50.00 per person plus the overtime to attend. At this time there is only one individual interested in going. He believes the class is being given in Pleasant Valley. He would like to keep it open in case other members would like to attend. He feels it is a very valuable class for new firefighters as well as seasoned firefighters. No decision needs to be made on it at this point.
In Deputy Chief Zittel's absence, Chief Champion reported he has coordinated being a host for OFPC Ice Rescue Training course in the early part of 2027. That will be local.
- **Out of County Training** - Chief Champion stated there was a request made by DCSO for the Fire District to obtain training related to incidents involving protests, related lock in devices, and similar situations. The goal is to establish a team within the Fire District pertaining to the technical rescue members for future needs. Nothing is concrete at this time. This training would be limited to technical rescue and extrication operations and absolutely no law enforcement aspects. The individuals would be receiving instruction in protest situations, legal considerations, responsibilities of extrication teams and extrication techniques required to defeat protester devices. Initially the cost to the district would be the employees pay associated with overtime and covering the shift. At this time there has been no assertion as to whether there is a cost for attendance at the actual class, lodging or meals. He is looking to send eight people in two to three incremental

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waves. The training starts next week but he does not believe he has anyone signed up for that session. Additional trainings are September 8th through the 12th, October 13th through the 17th, and November 15th through the 19th, and the training is to occur at the Field Force Extrication Tactics Course located at the Center for Domestic Preparedness in Anderson, Alabama. He does not have estimated costs for travel lodging or food at this time. The only cost that has been relate to them has been the cost for overtime for those attending and for those covering shifts.

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Kaiser and SECONDED by Chairman Komorsky, the Board RESOLVED to approve up to eight firefighters based on the Chief's recommendation and scheduling to the above mentioned training. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky - Aye. **Motion Carried.**

- **Mutual Aid** - Chief Champion stated today they hosted a radio/pager programming class with Arlington.
- Due to a call being dispatched Chief Champion had to leave but recommended the Doyle alarm system replace anything that is broken. He will get quotes for things over the course of next year. He does have a few items for executive session if they are still here when he gets back.
- **Deputy Chief Bryan Zittel**
 - There was no report in Deputy Chief Zittel's absence.
- **Deputy Chief Scott Merritt**
 - There was no report in Deputy Chief Zittel's absence.
- **Department** – Commissioner Kaiser stated past paid member and volunteer Michael & Robert Caso's mom passed away. She was just shy of 104 years old. A past auxiliary member, Sina Macak passed as well. Chairman Komorsky stated the Board sends their condolences to the Caso family and the Macak family.
- **Union** – No one was present.

ABSTRACT: \$321,732.69

Upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Tierney and SECONDED by Commissioner Taft, the Board RESOLVED to pay the bills for the end of June 2026, as per the abstract in the amount of \$321,732.69. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky – Aye. **Motion carried.**

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

At 6:54 PM, Chairman Komorsky opened the meeting to public comments.

Mr. Siegel stated that all of the answers that the Town received back from Rieger project are on the Town website under the Planning Board's page. There is a link to a portal and every development project that is current in LaGrange is listed there with all of the associated

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documents. The larger point the Fire District is making was why they were not told. Communication is easy if you want to do it. Good governing is what they're asking for and that is something that can be difficult. He does appreciate Chairman Komorsky's candor when he speaks about the Town Center and these storage facilities. He does plan on being at both the Planning Board and the Town Board meetings. It is too bad that the people of the Town are not being listened to and that the Town is not taking public safety to the degree that they need to. To him it seems like it is the opposite thing that they should be doing if they care about the residents. Chairman Komorsky stated on behalf of the Board of Fire Commissioners and the Secretary, they have reached out verbally and in writing to request a meeting with the Town Board to express the Fire District's needs and concerns and the Town Board has yet to give a date or time to meet with them. Commissioner Kaiser stated there has been no communication back from the Town. Secretary Le stated she did get a response from the Town Supervisor who agreed to meet individually. Chairman Komorsky stated they want to meet with the whole Town Board, not individually and they have stated that. The Town Supervisor did supply a date and a time, at 11 AM, for just him to be available. Chairman Komorsky stated they want the whole Fire District Board and the whole Town Board to meet together and that has not happened. They will continue to do what they have to do and make their presence known in other areas. He would also like to state that on behalf of the Board of Fire Commissioners and the staff and members of the fire department they want to thank Legislator Emma Arnoff, Dave Siegel and Peter Turoff. During the storm, the Fire District was being toned out roughly every 2 1/2 minutes. They were kind enough to bring pizza and donuts over the two day period to everybody who was working. He did want to thank the three of them for that kind and considerate action. Staff was not eating at normal times and running all over the place for calls and this was greatly appreciated.

At 6:59 PM, public comments were closed.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

At 7:01 PM, upon a MOTION made by Commissioner Kaiser and SECONDED by Commissioner Tierney, the Board RESOLVED to go into Executive Session to discuss three contractual/legal items from Commissioner Tierney, one legal item for Station 1 from Commissioner Kaiser, one legal issue from Attorney Hekle, and personnel issue from Chief Champion/Secretary Le. Kaiser – Aye, Taft – Aye, Tierney – Aye, Komorsky – Aye. **Motion Carried.**

OPEN SESSION:

At 7:49 PM, the Board resumed Open Session.

PREPARE 7/28/26 MEETING AND WORKSHOP AGENDA: Secretary Le will prepare this. There was discussion regarding starting this meeting with a workshop and the Chief mentioned if they want to swear in any new hires they would like to do that this night as well so they have time to get situated before the Utica Academy starts. Attorney Hekle stated they could start the meeting and opening it as a workshop allows them to go into executive session at that point if they need to as well. He stated it is still a public meeting. Commissioner Taft stated they would need to decide what the workshop was going to be about. Commissioner Tierney stated they are having a meeting on Thursday with the Chief BoFC Regular Meeting 7/14/26

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and the Treasurer to discuss equipment. Chairman Komorsky stated these are the issues that they would discuss at the workshop.

At this point the Chief gave the remainder of his comments as he had to leave earlier due to a call.

The Board has approved to replace any failed items in the alarm system at Station 2 and Station 3. He will get costs for replacements going out. Chairman Komorsky stated yes this was approved.

Chief Champion asked if there was any discussion on the radio tower. Chairman Komorsky stated no there was not. They were waiting for him for that. Chief Champion stated one of the items that is outstanding is that they are running a process to find a new location to better serve the radio needs. Unfortunately that did not come to fruition. What did present itself was the ability to move from the tower they are currently on to a new location on a tower at the back of Redl's yard. This is at higher location so it may get rid of any dead spots that they still have. In speaking with Eric Redl, he will reach out to his brother Frank. There was an offer to move that location without a change in the current agreement so he will work with his brother to get a new agreement written up and sent to the District. It will be on the tower behind the building and not on the building. With that comes an aspect of budgeting. They will need to prepare the space so it will require a concrete pad and a shed, heating, cooling, power, and a backup system. It would need a mini split for cooling like they have on the sheds outside. The building would have to be insulated so the radio equipment stays in a temperature controlled environment. Commissioner Tierney asked if this was something for this year or next year. Chief Champion stated it might take a little while to get it situated because he is unsure where the money would be coming from. He does know that he will be bringing up a conversation with the Town because the Town Garage does need to relocate and update their radio system as well. He is not sure if the Board is interested in shared services with them or maybe leasing out a space inside that shed or however the Board wants to do it. Chairman Komorsky stated they have been talking about this for a while. He feels they should do the pad, shed, and structures. Then they could discuss any possibilities with the Town Highway Department. Redl owns the tower on their property and rents space out on their tower. Chief Champion stated they may have to be placed below Verizon Cellular on the tower but they would be higher than where they are. That should help with a lot of their issues. Commissioner Taft asked what size shed they would need. Chief Champion stated they would have to come up with specs. It will depend on if they are going to allow others to come inside. If it is just them it could be something smaller if there are others it could be something as big as what they have already on site. They will have to be climate controlled. Commissioner Taft stated there are people that sell Verizon tower containers for this use. Commissioner Kaiser stated at this point they are just being informed by the Chief that this is a possibility and there could be a cost associated with it. Chairman Komorsky offered to assist the Chief if he would like additional help to start looking into sheds. Commissioner Tierney stated they do have to keep an eye on the costs. Chief Champion stated he will start working on this and have something for the workshop.

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Chief Champion stated the three Chiefs have been conducting daily briefings with the duty staff. The sessions are proving to be beneficial communication. They will be continuing to improve upon this process. It is open communication and conversations and they are highlighting higher level things that are happening and specific touching points. They are trying to capture every group at least once a week. Chairman Komorsky stated that Deputy Chief Merritt stated he will be going out to Station 1 every morning. Commissioner Kaiser stated that they will come here for training daily so they will be having those briefings here daily.

Chief Champion stated he was asked for a report on the July 4th incident. Deputy Chief Merritt did put together a report for them. A line of storms came through the area bringing torrential rain, downed trees, and widespread power outages across the area. During the height of the storm LaGrange Fire District crews responded to several alarms while operating in extremely hazardous conditions. Firefighters faced limited visibility due to heavy rains, road obstructions, falling trees, downed power lines, et cetera as they worked to reach residents and mitigate emergencies throughout the community. Calls included trees falling on homes damaging roofs, reported motor vehicle accidents on TSP, automatic fire alarms, smoke condition inside residents, electrical service wires being torn from homes, carbon monoxide emergencies involving ill patients caused by improper placements or malfunctioning generators. The danger continued well after the storm passed. In the aftermath crews responded to an additional 19 calls including additional medical emergencies, 9 carbon monoxide incidence with many involving symptomatic patients, 2 reports of power lines blocking roadways, and one motor vehicle accident. In total the district responded to 26 emergency calls during the storm and aftermath while continuing to protect the community while under difficult and rapidly changing conditions. During each of the responses crews demonstrated teamwork, problem solving, and determination. They did identify some operational weaknesses that should be addressed in future in addition budgetary needs such as additional chainsaws to assist with clearing paths to the scenes, As well as the need for additional CO oximeter tools to determine if patients are suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning and if so how severe the poisoning is. As of now they only have two of those in the district. He does have a list of the 26 calls if the Board would like to review them individually. Chief Merritt's report also goes into the video laryngoscope recall. One of the tools that they use is a video laryngoscope so they can visualize the vocal cords when they intubate a patient. They have 5 identical scopes and they were recalled due to system failure. That system failure could lead to an explosion. Three of the cameras are subject to recoil and need to be removed from inventory. They are working to get pricing together so they can replace all 5 at the same time so they don't have different devices in use. Captain Wern and Deputy Chief Merritt are continuing to monitor the controlled substances and the cabinets. They are looking for quotes for vendors for replacement moving forward as was previously stated. They are unable to duplicate the reported cabinet lock failures on 7/5 they opened the cabinet multiple times and did not identify any failures. They did complete a semiannual controlled substance inspection where all of the administered, purchased, and wasted medications were checked. The inspection report and associated paperwork were filed and signed by Dr. Felice, Chairman Komorsky and then sent to the Bureau of EMS and the Bureau of Narcotics Enforcement.

Chairman Komorsky stated that he and Commissioner Kaiser went out early Saturday morning and drove around various areas. There were cars and trucks that were crushed by trees, trees down in various areas. The area could have been incredibly more dangerous than it was. When Commissioner Kaiser and he were driving around Skylar Drive people were land locked in because trees had fallen. People were walking around and trying to cut their way out and there were wires and transformers down all over the place. The good thing was that there were no emergencies but it could have been disastrous with all of the wires that were down. Commissioner Kaiser had video of the storm hitting while some people were fishing. It could have been so much worse and a huge operation to get into that area to get to him had he been hurt when a huge tree came down. Chairman Komorsky stated he does appreciate that when he got on the internet he saw that the fire department put out an alert about using generators correctly. He did see two homes that had generators running inside their garages and he did stop and explain the dangers of the carbon monoxide issues. Chairman Komorsky stated on behalf of the Board of fire Commissioners he wanted to state that the crews did a fantastic job. He was getting notifications every 2 1/2 minutes with incoming calls and he wanted to make sure that they were all thanked for a job well done. Chief Champion stated they have expressed their gratitude for the crew's professionalism and have informed them of that during their meetings. Chairman Komorsky stated for the record when he and Commissioner Kaiser were driving around they went into various neighborhoods. Much to their credit when they were asking people who were stuck if anyone else had come to check on them and they were told no. The public was very appreciative of the Fire Department. Commissioner Kaiser stated that Central Hudson did bring crews in from other states. His question to them would be that his neighborhood was impassable. There are lines involved and town highway will not push trees that are down with wires in them. He stated his concern would be why can't Central Hudson at least get to an area like that and declare the line dead and push it out of the way. Maybe that is something they can ask Central Hudson moving forward. They had someone babysitting a down line that was live for two days. There are approximately 12 poles in his neighborhood alone that need to be replaced. There's no way they could have gotten there for a medical condition or a fire. Chairman Komorsky stated as a result of what they saw on their drive around he called Central Hudson four times as a resident to let them know that there are people trapped in their areas and the response he received was that there were emergencies all over the place and they would get there as soon as they could. Chief Champion stated one accident that he was at today involving a telephone pole that was snapped 12 feet up. The road was closed because the cable lines were hanging low and one of the things the Central Hudson rep said is that they just signed a new contract so they are trying to hire more people. Like everywhere else it seems to be a shortage of manpower.

Chief Champion stated that he will not be in town from August 4th through August 25th.

The customer has requested pricing to properly weatherproof the facade area following the removal of four columns.

1. Maintain full compliance with all applicable public and site-specific safety regulations throughout the duration of the project.
2. Install wood blocking over the newly leveled facade surface to provide proper support and alignment for subsequent materials.
